

Introduction 2020

Of course, the 2020 season was totally overshadowed by the pandemic. The lockdown restrictions meant that transects could not be walked for part of the year, and visits to some sites were not possible. However, it did mean that more people were able to record butterflies in their gardens, or on walks from their homes. This resulted in more records being submitted than ever before – a total of 72,200! Once again much of the credit for this report is due to John Bangay, who has converted all the sightings recorded on iRecord, Transect Walker and the Garden Butterfly and Big Butterfly Count schemes and put them into a form that I can study and pick out highlights. He has also produced all the maps for the report. Records that have been sent directly to me by email or on paper recording forms have also been entered onto the Branch database and sent to the Co-ordinator of the National Recording Scheme. Butterfly Conservation is very grateful to you for your efforts. The records will be used to update the national distribution maps so that changes in butterfly populations can be monitored.

There were several periods of hot, dry weather in 2020, making it a good year for many butterflies. Several of our rare species, such as Heath Fritillary and Duke of Burgundy, did well and there were more Nymphalids around, even Small Tortoiseshells. Another highlight was a sighting of a Grayling, after six years absence! Brown Hairstreak continued to increase its range in the Bromley/Orpington area and new sites were discovered for Silver-spotted Skipper, Small Blue, Silver-washed Fritillary, Wall and Purple Emperor. Some species, such as Brown Argus, were in rather low numbers, possibly because of drying out of their foodplants when in the larval stage.

Numbers of the commoner migrants, such as Painted Lady and Clouded Yellow, were quite low but several Swallowtails and Large Tortoiseshells were seen, plus a few Long-tailed Blues, a Camberwell Beauty and a Queen of Spain Fritillary.



Map of all 2020 butterfly sightings


In this distribution map, the size of the dot indicates the number of records from that 2 kilometre square.



2020 was the first year of the latest five-year recording period, as used by Butterfly Conservation nationally for comparing populations of butterflies between different time periods, so that changes can be assessed.




After the early sighting of **Dingy Skipper** at Lydden by Steve Cutt on 9th April, the next sighting wasn't until the 20th. There were some high counts at Wye Downs, with 17 seen by David Harper on 23 April and 22 by Emily Neighbour on 15 May. Further east along the North Downs, Joan Martin and Kelvin Reel found 59 roosting at Brabourne on 8 May, and Dan Tuson reported 17 at Postling and 29 at Wolverton in late May. In the western half of the county there were counts of 19 by Ewan Shilland near Cudham on 9 May and by Fred O'Hare at High Elms CP on 18 May, while John Waghorn counted 21 at Trosley CP on 16 May and Stephen Weeks saw 16 near Upper Halling on 15 May. The first generation ended on 14 June and there was a large second generation starting on 11 July and with highest counts of 35 on 29 July by Alfie Gay at Cheriton Hill, near Folkestone, and 16 on 20 July by Robert Newington at Lydden Hill.



Counts of **Grizzled Skipper** were again rather low in 2020, with the only double-figure count being 12 found at a site at Kingsnorth, near Ashford, by Rob Price on 20 May. John Waghorn saw 9 at Trosley CP on 16 May and there were counts of 7 in late April from Daphne Mills at Burham and Fred O'Hare at High Elms CP. The good news is that several new sites were discovered for this species: - at Farningham (Monica Percival), Ham Hill, near Snodland (Mike Easterbrook), Throwley (Tony Witts & Amy Poole), Horsmonden (Stephen Mills) and Sparrow Wood, near Orpington (Wanda Hagan).

Numbers of **Essex Skippers** remained low in 2020. The highest counts were 40 at Woolwich Common on 5 July from Paul Gibbs and 25 at Dungeness BO on 17 July from David Walker. The first sighting on 30 May by Mike Robinson was three weeks earlier than in 2019.





There were some high counts of **Small Skipper** in 2020, with 500 recorded by Derek Tutt at Chetney Marshes on 12 July, 250 seen at Dungeness Bird Observatory by David Walker on 18 June and 102 counted at Sandwich Bay by Steffan Walton on 23 June.



There was an incredibly early sighting of **Silver-spotted Skipper** on 29 June by John and Liz Pell at Queendown Warren. Good numbers were seen at Queendown, with 25 counted by Chris Barnes on 2 August and 21 by Howard Vaughan on the 4th. John Websper and Mike Sykes recorded 93 at a site near Lydden on 24 August and 8 at Great Watersend on 10 August, while Francesca Partridge saw 10 at Temple Ewell on the 15th. Dan Tuson found this butterfly at two sites at Ewell Minnis, with 22 seen in total, and Iona Dubieniec discovered one at a site in the Alkham Valley. Small numbers (2 to 3) were seen in the South Foreland

area by Ian Hodgson and Mike Watts on separate occasions.



There were good numbers of **Large Skipper** in the Wye area, with 39 counted on Wye Downs on 22 June by Emily Neighbour and 19 seen at Wye Crown on 15 June by Ade Jupp. Robert Insall recorded 35 at Hothfield Common on 24 June. Further east, Bill Martin had counts of 22 at both Covert Wood, Barham and Telegraph Farm, Tilmanstone, while Alfie Gay counted 27 on Folkestone Downs.





There were fewer sightings of **Clouded Yellow** in the spring of 2020 than in recent years, with only three records in April and three in May. After that they were only seen in ones and twos for most of the year, with a few counts of 3 in September, a count of 5 at Brabourne on 20 September and a report of 4 at St Margaret's on 11 October.

There were some high counts of **Brimstone** in the spring of 2020, with 31 seen by David Harper at Wye Downs on 7 April, 29 counted by Kevin Tolhurst at Darland Banks on 20 May and 25 seen by Michael Walter at RSPB Blean Woods on 15 May. John Bangay recorded 16 at Kemsing Down on 15 May and there were counts of 14 by Fred O'Hare at Biggin Hill and Janet Wilson at Downe Bank in mid-May. Numbers were lower later in the year, though Howard Vaughan counted 15 at Plantlife's Ranscombe Farm reserve, Cuxton on 30 July and Alan Cooper saw 15 at Orlestone Forest on 4 August.




The warm weather in the spring of 2020 resulted in five sightings of **Orange-tip** in March. There were several double-figure counts. Peter and Pauline Heathcote counted 25 at Hartley Woods on 23 April, David Harper reported 15 at Wye Downs on 26 April and Sarah Ingle saw 12 at Basted on 12 April. David Eade reported 11 at Edenbridge and there were counts of 10 at Haysden CP and Dene Park by Christopher Dobson, also 10 at Rainham by Iain Akers and at Herne Bay by Arnie van Orsouw, all in April. There was again a late sighting in July.


Numbers of **Large White** were low early in the year, though Darren Day saw 28 at Nettlestead Green on 27 April. The highest counts were in July. On the 3rd Jill Carr saw over 30 in a field of soya beans at Five Oak Green and Lucy Adams saw 26 at Shorne. On the 7th Jack Stubbins counted 85 at Conningbrook Lakes, on the 11th David Harper saw 102 at Wye, and on 17th Alison Hedley saw 48 at Jury's Gap and Mark Pickford reported 60 at Penshurst. Evelyn Andrews saw 44 at Woolage Green on the 24th and Graham Skinner counted 47 at Kennington on 29th. In early August Keith Gates saw 37 at Dymchurch and Jim Jameson 60 at Faversham.

There were some high counts of **Small White** in late June and throughout July. Pauline and Peter Heathcote saw 60 at New Barn on 25 June, while John Smith recorded 181 at Reculver CP on 23 June and 261 on 12 July. On 11 July David Harper saw 124 at Wye, Emily Neighbour saw 91 at St Margaret's Bay and Ian Hodgson 76 at nearby South Foreland, suggesting a possible immigration from France. Martin Newcombe counted 72 at Wrinsted on 12 July and Steffan Walton recorded 86 at Sandwich Bay on the 7th. There were high counts at RSPB Cliffe Pools, with 126 there on 22 July (Barrie Puttock), 166 on 10 August (Derek Goodban) and 100 on 20 September (Grant Hazlehurst). Further inland, Cameron Rance saw 160 at Sandhurst on 23 July.





The highest counts of **Green-veined White** were all in the second half of July. Peter Tyler saw 39 at Foxden Wood, near Egerton, on the 17th, Pippa Spiridonov reported 40 at Orpington on 18th, Sharon Jones saw 20 at Dartford on 26th and Robert Insall counted 31 at Hothfield Common on 29th.



There was only one double-figure count of **Green Hairstreak** in 2020 but that was a high one, with 24 counted at Brabourne on 24 April by Joan Martin and Kelvin Reel. There were counts of 7 at Darland Banks by Kevin Tolhurst and at High Elms CP by Fred O'Hare, while Nick Osler saw 6 at Shoreham.



There were counts of 7 **White-letter Hairstreaks** at the Royal Military Canal, near Warehorne by Peter Burness and Rob Price on 18 June and at High Elms CP by Keith Perry on 25 June, and 6 were seen by Colin Brotherwood at RSPB Northward Hill on 28 June. New sites for this species were discovered at Adisham Woods (Keith Heaven), Cobham Park (Howard Vaughan), Nash St (Karen Hall), Rochester (Carole Tyrrell), Greenwich Park (Joe Beale) and Gravesend (Malcolm Jennings).



At Keston Fred O'Hare saw 7 **Brown Hairstreak** adults on 20 August and Eric Barlow reported 3 at Nash on 1 September. Adults were seen in the West Wickham area by Cliff Robson, Sue Jones and Fred O'Hare and there was further evidence of spread with the discovery of eggs at Jubilee CP, near Orpington by Peter Smart and at Ninehams Wood, near Farnborough by Bob Harrop. In the other part of our region where this species has appeared, David Eade saw an adult at Edenbridge on 27 August.







At Dungeness Bird Observatory David Walker had peak counts of 80 **Small Copper** in the first generation on 22 May, 60 in the second brood on 24 June and 20 in the third on 6 September. Dawn White saw 27 at Deal on 21 July, Jenny Bough counted 15 at Rough Common on 20 July and Paula Hardy reported 16 at Brasted on 30 July. In September David Eade recorded 41 at Edenbridge on the 9th and Robert Insall counted 17 on Hothfield Common on the 20th.

Small Blue is doing well at Brabourne, where Joan Martin and Kelvin Reel counted 134 roosting on 25 May. Dan Tuson discovered a colony at Kingston, where he counted 67 on 29 May. He also found small numbers at Spong Wood and Wolverton. At the other end of the county Keith Perry saw 60 at Biggin Hill, Anna Guerin counted 6 at West Kent Golf Course, Downe, Janet Wilson found 1 at Downe Bank and Eric Barlow saw 1 at Spring Park Meadow. In mid-Kent Howard Vaughan recorded 40 at Ranscombe Farm, Cuxton and 15 on the Medway Gate Estate.



Numbers of **Brown Argus** remained low in 2020, and there were no counts over 20. The highest numbers were in August, with counts of 19 at Brabourne on the 9th (Joan Martin & Kelvin Reel) and Lydden on the 24th (John Websper). Alan Cooper saw 15 in Orlestone Forest and Emily Neighbour 14 at Wye Downs on the 16th and John Waghorn saw 13 at Queendown Warren on the 1st.



There was some improvement in numbers of **Common Blue** in 2020, particularly in the second generation. In mid-May Francesca Partridge saw 32 at Darland Banks and Nick Osler counted 30 at Shoreham but the highest counts were in July and August. Martin Newcombe recorded 144 at Wrinsted on 7 August, David Walker saw 100 at Dungeness Bird Observatory on the 16th and Cathy Myles counted 90 at Wraik Hill on the 2nd. Maggie Moore saw 101 at Temple Ewell on 8 August and on the 6th there were counts in the fifties at St Margaret's-at-Cliffe (Deborah O'Boyle), Samphire Hoe (Lindsey Mitchell) and Sandwich Bay (Steffan Walton).



Chalk Hill Blue is now doing well at KWT's Fackenden Down reserve and Derek Goodban estimated 400 there on 26 July. Fred O'Hare saw 75 at the adjacent White Hill reserve on 21 July and he also reported 176 at Biggin Hill on 30 July. Jo Hay saw 100 on Greenhill Down, Otford on 29 July and Kevin Tolhurst recorded 122 at Darland Banks on 30 July. There were also some high counts in south-east Kent, with 300 seen at Lighthouse Down, South Foreland by Keith Heaven, 178 counted by Emily Neighbour at Langdon Cliffs, 127 seen by John Websper at Lydden and 100 by Francesca Partridge at Temple Ewell, all in early August.



Numbers of **Adonis Blue** weren't very high in 2020 but Alfie Gay reported 91 on Horseshoe & Round Hills above Folkestone on 31 August. Francesca Partridge saw 30 at Temple Ewell on 15 August and in the first generation John Waghorn counted 26 at Queendown Warren on 24 May.



Holly Blues were very numerous in 2020. Phyllis Davis had an annual total of 120 in her garden at Rainham, up from 108 in 2019. In the first generation Sue Smith counted 27 at Dumpton on 30 May and Doug Stannard saw 25 at Tenterden on 8 May. In the second brood Pippa Spiridonov saw 40 at Orpington on 18 July and on 2 August Suzi Williamson reported 22 at Harvel and Deborah O'Boyle saw 19 at St Margaret's-at-Cliffe. Not surprisingly given the warm summer, there was a third generation, with several sightings in October and one in November.



Duke of Burgundy had a very good year in 2020, with the total maximum number across all sites the highest for the last 25 years. Thirteen colonies were recorded by a group of volunteers (thanks to Claire Ward for leading the volunteers and to Dan Tuson for a summary report) and these consisted of eight small colonies (peak of 2-8 individuals) and five medium to large colonies (9-53). Alan Cooper counted 53 at a site on private land on 19 May and on 15 May Claire Ward recorded 30 at Bonsai Bank and 21 at The Warren Woodland Trust site. Dan Tuson reported 32 and 23 at two other sites which are on private land. This butterfly is continuing to take advantage of the increasing amount of suitable habitat across the landscape that has been the focus of Natural England's grassland habitat creation work over the last 10-15 years.



In late May David Harper saw 20 **Small Heaths** at Wye Downs and Fred O'Hare recorded 17 at Biggin Hill. On 1 June David Eade saw 21 at Edenbridge and Steffan Walton counted 16 at Sandwich Bay and in mid-June there were counts of 18 at Queendown Warren (Rob Pennington), 17 at Charing (Amanda Brookman), 30 at Elmley (Jill Tardivel), 30 at Penshurst Place (Matthew Baseden), 22 at Church Hougham (Paolo Farina), 30 at Dungeness BO (David Walker) and 86 at Marlpit Hill (Naomi Ward). In July Anne Davis saw 30 at Blean and in August Pauline & Peter Heathcote reported 40 at New Barn and Karen Hill recorded 33 on Allhallows Marshes. Overall, numbers were lower than in 2019.



There were quite a lot of double-figure counts of **Speckled Wood** in 2020. Janet Wilson saw 20 at Downe Bank in late June and in July Ruth Bradshaw recorded 12 in Greenwich Park, Jacquie Tyson saw 14 in Mote Park, Maidstone and Peter Frost counted 16 in Folkestone Warren. In August Ricky Atkin reported 24 at Footscray Meadows and Alfie Gay recorded 23 on Folkestone Downs.





There were high numbers of Walls on the south-east coast of Kent in 2020. Jay Jarman-Chantler recorded 36 at Bockhill, St Margaret's on 3 August and there were counts of 15 and 16 from nearby South Foreland from Keith Heaven and Ian Hodgson, also in early August. Gary Linney counted 18 at Kingsdown, Emily Neighbour recorded 17 at Langdon Cliffs and Alfie Gay saw 20 on Folkestone Downs. Alongside the Thames Estuary on the Hoo Peninsula there were counts of 24 at Grain in September from Mike Easterbrook and David Chambers, 9 at Cliffe Pools in August from John Waghorn and 7 at Allhallows Marshes in July from Karen Hall. There was also a record of one at Botany Marshes, Swanscombe from Kelly-Ann McGuinness and three records of singles on the Isle of Sheppey from Karen Thorpe, Stuart Goodwin and Rebecca Levey. In the Wye/Brabourne area there were counts of 16 by Piers Griffin and 10 from Joan Martin, while Iona Dubieniec counted 11 at a site in the Alkham Valley and Bill Martin saw 9 at Tilmanstone. Numbers seem to be building in the area south of Sittingbourne, where Martin Newcombe recorded 13 on the Torry Estate. There were more indications of a return to inland sites in other areas, with records from Bluebell Hill (Rob Pennington), Borden Hill (Tracey Corbishley), Walderslade (Hayley Rose) and Sandhurst (Emma Budgen).



High numbers of **Marbled White** were recorded in mid-Kent. Christina Lamb saw 300 in Horsted Valley, near Chatham, Robert Pennington counted 59 at Darland Banks, Howard Vaughan saw 70 at Bredhurst and Peter & Pauline Heathcote reported 80 at New Barn, all in late June. Numbers continue to increase in north-west Kent, with 250 seen at Farnborough by Keith Perry, 126 at Downe Bank by Janet Wilson, 149 near Downe by Anna Guerin and 90 at Green St Green by Cathy Murphy. In the Darent Valley area John Bangay recorded 114 at Kemsing Down and Colin Brotherwood 60 at Lullingstone CP. In the traditional stronghold for this species in south-east Kent Alfie Gay counted 102 on Folkestone Downs and Robert Newington saw 182 at Lydden Hill.

In the Ashford area Mike Bax saw 100 at Shadoxhurst, Lindsey Mitchell 61 at Singleton, Piers Griffin 68 at Wye Downs and Joan Martin & Kelvin Reel 138 at Brabourne.

There was an early sighting of **Dark Green Fritillary** on 2 June, then no more records until the 13th. There seems to have been a sharp decline in numbers at Lullingstone Country Park, where the highest count was 12, recorded by Howard Vaughan on 23 June. At other sites in that area, John Bangay counted 7 at Kemsing Down and Derek Goodban saw 5 at Fackenden Down. In the north-west of our area Keith Perry counted 6 at High Elms CP, Anna Guerin saw 4 at West Kent Golf Course, Downe, Steve Bolton 2 at Saltbox Hill and singles were seen by both Janet Wilson and Grant Hazlehurst at Downe Bank and by Steven Lofting at Hangrove Bank. In mid-Kent Mark Gracey recorded 4 at Trosley CP, Kevin Tolhurst saw 3 at Darland Banks and individuals were seen at Bredhurst (Howard Vaughan; Robert Knight), Burham (Rob Pennington) and Coxheath (Keith Ferris). 

Jill Tardivel found 100 **Peacocks** hibernating in underground rooms at Fort Burgoyne, near Dover in January 2020. Outdoors, there were some high counts in early April, with 16 seen at Lesnes Abbey by Mike Robinson, 20 at Tenterden by Doug Stannard, 53 at Church Wood, Blean by Michael Walter, 25 at Margate Cemetery by Stephen Blaskett, 33 at Wraik Hill by Cathy Myles, 46 at Wye by David Harper and 20 at Great Crabbles Wood by Howard Vaughan. There were large numbers in the summer generation in July too, including 100 at Dungeness (Stanley Furlongs), 168 at Hothfield (Robert Insall), 150 at Adisham (David White), 102 at Sissinghurst (Sally Harris), 73 at Gravesend (Lucy Hayes), 54 at Aldington (Eric Filler) and 50 at Hemsted Forest (Graham Grimmett). Most of these butterflies disappeared into cooler overwintering sites in the hot weather and few were seen after July, although there were seventeen records of singles in November.

OTHER, NON-RESIDENT, SPECIES

SWALLOWTAIL

There was an early sighting of a Swallowtail at Hever on 15 April by Jo Cockerill. This was followed by one seen by Sharon Norman at Capel-le-Ferne on 30 May, with another seen there by Dale Gibson on 2 August. In early June Ross Newham saw one near Dungeness and another (or the same one) was seen by Graham Parry at Lydd. Brian Adams spotted one at Folkestone Warren on 22 July and Nigel Stapley had one on Buddleia in his garden at Kemsing on 10 August.

LONG-TAILED BLUE

There were sightings of single Long-tailed Blue at Kingsdown by Francesca Partridge on 8 August and by Howard Vaughan on the 10th. In September Alfie Gay found 2 adults on the Downs above Folkestone on the 14th and Chris Randall saw 3 at Pegwell Bay on the 21st.

LARGE TORTOISESHELL

At least seven Large Tortoiseshells were seen in 2020. Derek Smith saw one at Denge on 21 March then in April Lawrence Rogers saw one at Barnehurst on the 9th, David Walker had sightings at Dungeness BO on 11th and 22nd, and Carol Wade and Roger Newton reported one at South Foreland on 12th. Later in the year there were records in mid-July from Natalie Dean at Brasted, Pat Straughan at Hadlow and Jane Rogers at West Wickham.

CAMBERWELL BEAUTY

A Camberwell Beauty was seen at Marden by Alan Pavey on 13 August.

QUEEN OF SPAIN FRITILLARY

John & Emily Neighbour saw a Queen of Spain Fritillary at South Foreland on 22 September, in the same area where one was seen in summer 2019.
